Ed has briefed and argued hundreds of appeals in the State and Federal Courts, and is noted for numerous important decisions in the areas of Professional Liability, Insurance Coverage, Negligence, Premise Liability, Product Liability, Real Estate Brokerage Liability, and New York procedure.

Formerly, Ed served as law assistant to the Court at the Appellate Division, First Department, and as special counsel to the New York City Health & Hospitals Corporation. He is also a contributing editor of the treatise "New York Medical Malpractice," Bard & Morano. He has served at a Committee level on several New York State legislative initiatives to remedy legal system inequities, both procedural and substantive.
